

## PRGC CONVENTION REPORT

This past April, I attended the Pacific Region Garden Clubs, Inc. (PRGC) Convention in Van Nuys, California. OPD is part of the PRGC that includes WACONIAH- which is an acronym for our region: **W**ashington, **A**rizona, **C**alifornia, **O**regon, **N**evada, **I**daho, **A**laska, and **H**awaii.

I attended a variety of classes that included:

- **Making Seed Balls and Bombs:** A seed ball (or bomb) is one or more seeds that are wrapped in soil, usually a mixture of clay and compost, and then dried. Essentially, the seed(s) are “pre-planted” and can be sown by depositing the seed ball anywhere suitable for the species, keeping the seed(s) safely until the proper germination window arises. Seed balls are an easy and sustainable way to cultivate plants in a way that provides a larger window of time when the sowing can occur. They are also a convenient dispersal mechanism for guerrilla gardeners and people with achy backs joe. For more information see: <https://kidsgardening.org/garden-activities-seed-balls/>.




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### Roasted Autumn Vegetables with Rice, Cranberries and Walnuts

#### Ingredients

2 medium carrots  
1 large turnip  
1 medium red onion  
1 large Granny Smith apple, diced  
1 tsp cinnamon  
1/2 tsp ground ginger  
1/4 tsp freshly ground nutmeg  
1/4 tsp sea salt  
1/4 cup olive oil  
1 1/2 cups long grain brown rice  
1 cup walnuts  
2 scallions, thinly sliced  
1/2 cup dried cranberries (sweetened with fruit juice, not sugar)

#### Directions

Preheat oven to 375F.

Chop up your vegetables and apple, then place in a large bowl and stir in the spices and sea salt. Toss with olive oil until evenly coated, then place onto a cookie sheet. Roast until tender, about 15-20 minutes.

While the vegetables cook, prepare the brown rice and walnuts. Place the walnuts onto cookie sheet and bake until golden brown. Remove from the oven, let cool then roughly chop.

Cook the rice in 3 cups of water according to rice instructions. Keep warm.

Once the vegetables are tender, remove from the oven and place in a large bowl. Toss together with the chopped walnuts, scallions, dried cranberries and cooked rice. Taste, adjust seasonings and serve. YUM.

**Penny Pines National Project**


This is a program dedicated to sustaining our national and urban forests. It was begun in 2004 as a partnership with the US Forest Service of the US Department of Agriculture. In 2018 members of National Garden Clubs donated \$72,828 to U.S. state and national forests!!! This translates to 1071 Penny Pines plantations each of which consists of 200 seedlings planted in the 50 states.

**GENERAL SHOW RULES**

1. All entries must be placed between 9:00 AM and 9:50 AM, Tuesday October 22, 2019
2. Entry cards to be used will be provided to each club via District Board Meeting.
3. Judging will begin at 10:00 AM by NGC accredited judges
4. All entries (Horticulture and Design) will be placed by exhibitors in the appropriate class.
5. The schedule is the Law of the Show. Judges and exhibitors must follow the rules given.

**DIVISION I – HORTICULTURE**

**Horticulture Rules**

1. All horticulture entries must be fresh, grown by the exhibitor, and in exhibitor’s possession 90 days, except for combined planters which must be grown together for 6 weeks (45 days).
2. Horticulture entries should be identified by their binomial name or currently accepted scientific identification, plus common name for educational purposes.
3. When more than one stem is required, all should be identical in size, age, color, stem length.
4. More than one entry per horticulture class or subclass may be made by an exhibitor provided each is a different cultivar, type or color.
5. Entries should be well groomed and conditioned.
6. Exhibitors must provide their own containers. All containers should be appropriately sized, clear, without color and clean. Inconspicuous wedging to hold specimen upright is permitted.
7. Leaves must not be in water in container.
8. Evergreen (conifer) branches do not need to be placed in a container.

**Class 1. Annuals**—Any worthy specimen: One stem large flower (over 2” diam), 3 stems small.

1A. Round Form                      1B. Spray Form                      1C. Stalk Form

**Class 2. *Dahlia***—must be disbudded with two leaves present on flower stem.

2A. Large (> 4” diam) one stem      2B. Small (< 4” diam) 3 stems

All are subclassed by color

**Class 3. Other Perennials/Bulbs**—Any worthy specimen: One stem large (>2” diam), 3 stems small

3A. Round Form                      3B. Spray Form                      3C. Stalk Form

**Class 4. Arboreal Flowers (Shrubs and Trees)**

4A. *Hydrangea*                      4B. Any other Flowering Shrub or Tree

**Class 5. Arboreal Foliage (Shrubs and Trees)** Branches 12” to 30” in length

5A. Evergreen Shrub      5B. Evergreen Conifer Tree      5C. Berried Shrub or Tree

5D. Deciduous shrub/tree showing fall leaf color

**Class 6. Edible Produce**

6A. Fruits (large 3 per plate, small 5 per plate, ½ C. berries)

6B. Vegetables (large single, medium (like corn) 3 per plate, small 10 per plate

6C. Herbs – 3 foliage stems per appropriate sized container

## DIVISION II – DESIGN

### Design Rules

1. Artificial flowers, fruit or foliage (silk, plastic etc.) are not permitted
2. Plant materials used in design do not have to be grown by the exhibitor.
3. **NEW:** Include a 3 x 5 card with all plant material named (scientific or common name) listed.
4. All designs must use some **FRESH** plant material, which cannot be treated with paint, spray, shine, etc. It can be clipped, braided, twisted, etc.
5. Dried plant material can be embellished with sprays, paint, etc.
6. A single flower or a container grown plant used alone is not a “floral design”
7. All designs must be the work of only one exhibitor.
8. Accessories and/or underlays may be used in all designs
9. Space allotted is 18” width on tables—therefore backgrounds are **not** to be used.
10. An exhibitor may enter only one design per class, but enter as many classes as desired.
- 11 Designer’s Choice means freedom to choose design type (style) and materials—except that each design must contain some FRESH plant material for this show.

**Class 1. “Spring Has Sprung”**—Grouped Mass Creative Design. Designer’s Choice of Materials

**Class 2. “Blue Skies at the Summer Beach”**—A design using decorative wood (driftwood) Designer’s Choice of Style

**Class 3. “Autumn Leaves”**—A Creative Design emphasizing colors of autumn. Designer’s Choice of Materials

**Class 4. “Winter Wonderland”**—A Petite Design 3” to 8” in all dimensions featuring White.. Designer’s Choice of Style and Materials

**Class 5. “Come Ye Thankful People Come”**—An Exhibition Table Design for Thanksgiving. Designer’s Choice of Materials

**Class 6. “Black of Midnight Halloween Witches”** --Designer’s Choice of Style and Materials

### Definitions for Flower Show Fall District Meeting 2019

**Grouped Mass Design:** A mass design of only plant material with radial placement

Like material is grouped and placed next to other different grouped like material

Additional plant material may be included, but the proportion of groupings dominate the design

Plant material emanates from one point of emergence

**Exhibition Table Design:** Not meant to be functional. Created artistically to suggest the service of food with no requirements as to the type or number of table appointments. Plant material must be used as needed for the overall design. Table appointments: dishes, beverage service, flatware. Coverings: cloth, runners, underlays, mats. Napkins. Decorative Unit—floral/plant material. Candles (OK but not necessary)

**Design Type:** Specific—such as Grouped Mass, Angular, Cascade, Illuminary, Reflective, Panel, Parallel etc.

**Designer’s Choice:** You can choose the style, type and materials (dried or fresh) used
